Exciting News for our Church Grounds!



Keep your eyes open for the appearance of a Michigan native-plant pollinator garden on the south side of the Annex! Our church received a \$1,000 grant from the Charlotte Generosity Fund to jumpstart the installation of the garden. The Pollinator Garden committee includes Jamie Curtis, Ramona Kime, Maria Davis, and Maria's student from Olivet, Mara Grey, who is very interested in native plants and is also using her work with us as her Service Learning project, a requirement for graduation from the University.

Unfortunately, many of the wildflower seeds that we've tossed in that space were of invasive species, including the beautiful but non-native orange Cosmos wildflowers that, like the invasive non-native plants they are, have taken over the area. One of the first steps will be to remove all plants that aren't native to Michigan. Then Jamie will dig up the ground and add in soil amendments. We are planning to create a flagstone path (with fake stones made of cement) through the area, and Allen Krizek will be building a wooden structure around the AC units to help them blend into the background.

There will be opportunities for our church family and friends to get involved. Those of us on the committee have our own plants growing in our home gardens to contribute to the project, but we will put out a call to the congregation to see if anyone has flowering perennial plants native to Michigan that they would like to contribute. There will also be opportunities for digging, planting and maintaining the garden, as well as making the concrete flagstones. Contact any committee member if you would like to help and we will get you connected!

Ultimately, we want this garden to have educational value, as well as being beautiful and providing nourishment for pollinators. We plan to create signs for the various plants, and Mara will be doing a presentation for us on the value of pollinator gardens.



Over the course of the next month or so, and then again in the spring, you will start to see activity in that area. It will be exciting to watch as the process unfolds and as the garden project takes root (pun intended!)!

And, most definitely, feel free to dress for your favorite parts! We're not saying our sanctuary is haunted, or


that we even believe in ghosts, but for this one single day, in the spirit of the season, we can have a lot of fun pretending.




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Let's Take a Trip

Nokomis Cultural Center, Okemos **Tuesday, October 15, 9:00 am**



There are 12 federally recognized tribes in the State of Michigan: Bay Mills Chippewa Indian Community, Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, Hannahville Potawatomi Indian Community, Keweenaw Bay Indian Community, Lac Vieux Desert Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indiana, Little River Band of Ottawa Indiana, Little Traverse Bay Band of Odawa Indians, Match-e-be-nash-she-wish Band of Pottawatomi Indians of Michigan (Gun Lake Tribe), Nottawaseppi Huron Band of Potawatomi, Pokegon Band of Potawatomi Indians, Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe, Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians.

The Nokomis Cultural Heritage Center, founded in 1988, is dedicated to the preservation of History, Arts, Culture and Language of the Anishinaabe people - Ojibwe, Odawa and Potawatomi nations. The Center fulfills this mission through programs, exhibitions and special events.

The Anishinaabe (alternatively spelled Anishinabe, Anicinape, Nishnaabe, Neshnabé, Anishinaabeg, Anishinaabek, Aanishnaabe) are a group of culturally related Indigenous peoples in the Great Lakes region of Canada and the United States. They include the Ojibwe (including Saulteaux and Oji-Cree), Odawa, Potawatomi, Mississaugas, Nipissing, and Algonquin peoples. The Anishinaabe speak Anishinaabemowin, or Anishinaabe languages that belong to the Algonquian language family. (Hele, Karl. "Anishinaabe," The Canadian Encyclopedia.)

At the time of first contact with Europeans they lived in the Northeast Woodlands and the Subarctic, and some have since spread to the Great Plains.

The word Anishinaabe means "people from whence lowered". Another definition is "the good humans", meaning those who are on the right road or path given to them by the Creator Gitche Manitou, or Great Spirit. Basil Johnston, an Ojibwe historian, linguist, and writer, wrote that the term's literal translation is "beings made out of nothing" or "spontaneous beings". The Anishinaabe believe that their people were created by divine breath. (Johnston, Basil (1990). Ojibway Heritage. Lincoln, NE: University of Nebraska Press. p. 15. ISBN 0803275722.)



The Festival of Trees a Tradition Raising Funds for Winter Boots

Can you believe it? It's almost Christmas!

Okay, not really, but it is time to begin to go through our boxes and begin making our lists

Thirteen years: that's how long the Festival of Trees has been wrapping itself around our hearts. This Charlotte holiday tradition, organized by local resident, Christmas enthusiast, and child educator, Amy Frost, is designed to raise funds to purchase winter boots for children.

The funds raised go to Eaton Clothing and Furniture Center to purchase and distribute boots for families whose budgets are stretched beyond capacity during the winter months especially.

Fully decorated and gift laden trees, holiday wall hangings, wreaths, quilts, and other items are donated by individuals, as well as local businesses and organizations to be auctioned off silently – in person and online. The online auction begins on Thanksgiving (the exact start time is always a fun surprise!) and goes through noon on Sunday, December 1. Usually, there is a last-minute bidding war on one or two especially popular items, so the auction might close a few minutes later. All of this is part of the fun.

On Friday, November 29 and Saturday, November 30, the trees can be viewed in all their beauty in the historical Sanctuary and Lounge at First Congregational United Church of Christ at 106 South Bostwick Street, Charlotte – the southwest corner of Lawrence and Bostwick.

Admittance is free, as is the holiday craft for children. Friday hours are 5 pm to 8 pm; Saturday hours are 10 am to 5 pm. The Saturday hours are purposefully scheduled to coincide with the start of Charlotte's Lighted Holiday parade, which begins at 6 pm.

Not HIM!

Jesus said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick; I have come to call not the righteous but sinners." - Mark 2:17 (NRSV)

Questions to think about:

- 1. Who has been a "tax collector" in your life? How do you feel imagining that person as a reflection of God?
- 2. How do you need forgiveness for your sins and God's embrace of grace?
- 3. Why would you ever talk to them?

There are lots of those folks. The writer of Mark calls them "tax collectors." I have other names for them. You do, too.

Just imagine the very worst person you can think of. The person who—if you say them on the street and felt a certain kind of courage that day—you'd spit at their feet, like they do in period films.

Maybe this person is someone who has done something awful to you, personally. But a better image would probably be someone who is doing something horrible to everyone around you. This is the revilement appropriately analogous to the tax collector. The guy who was part of a mechanism of financing of the state, who took a cut and squeezed everyone in his jurisdiction for every penny he could get.

You walk up to the place you know you'll find him, at the booth where he publicly carries out his lechery. Imagine how you feel as you anticipate seeing him.

Then imagine that you see Jesus. What would you expect from him?

If we accept Christ's divinity, we need to allow him to embrace our enemies.

God is not just ours.

And this is good news. Mark calls them "tax collectors and sinners." We miss the point if we forget that the sinners include: us.

Prayer

God, if we are going to get past the sins of the world, we will all need your embrace. Sigh. Amen.

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
