

of the encouragement you give me all of the time. Friends, we accomplished so much at First Congregational Church in 2024, and we gave so abundantly and joyfully to our home community. I'm optimistic that we will enjoy a continuation of the good work we've been doing.

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Our last Mission Board meeting of the year was December 15 and what a year it has been. When the annual church report comes out next month, please read the Mission Board report to see all that we accomplished this year.

Christmas Family: A family of six was adopted this year. All the tags were taken. Some folks wanted to donate and there were no tags left so for next year we are looking into gift cards that folks can purchase once all the tags are gone.

Winter Coat Project: 131 coats have been donated so far and \$1705 collected. This is better then last year. Thank you to everyone who contributed.

Loads of Love: This program is growing here in Charlotte. It appears that there are enough churches and organizations to cover one each month which was the goal of Peace Lutheran Church when they started it. Our next one is January 18. A mini grant was approved to pay for this one. The Giving Tree for January is for Loads of Love. We will be passing out small boxes/ canisters that folks can put their loose change in throughout the month and then collect them the end of the month, so start saving your change. Thank you to Blanche Moyer for donating \$200 to Loads of Love. We also received \$200 from Brenda Wood's insurance company a couple months ago. The folks we are serving are so grateful for the help. We also are still collecting adult books that we give away in addition to children's books.

Festival of Trees: This was another huge success this year. \$3188 was collected and given to EFCC to purchase winter boots for their clients. There were 59 entries this year and several folks wanting to donate next year. Thank you to Amy Frost, Jeannine Scott, David Frost, and Mary Kohmuench for all their hard work to see that this event happens.

From 2014 to now the Mission Board has donated \$13,610 from our restricted funds. This is in addition to our budgeted funds.

Our next meeting is January 19. Please come and join us and see what we're all about.

Church Stewardship: A New Year, A New Opportunity to Serve

As the calendar turns to a new year, many of us are busy reflecting on the past and making plans for the future. In the church, this time of year marks a transition from the final stages of budget planning for the year ahead to renewing our commitments to leadership and service. While finances are often the focus at the end of the year, the beginning of the year brings a reminder that stewardship isn't just about money; it's about time, talents, and active participation in the life of the church.

If you're looking for a way to give back, consider dedicating just a few hours a month to participate within your church community. We're an active church, and there's a constant need for volunteers to offer what they can, which may include planning and organizing events, signing up for shifts or supplies, to simply lending a hand before or after a service.

What can I do?

At the Annual Meeting in January, we welcome those willing to serve as church officers and team leaders. These are important roles in the life of the church, both in how decisions are made and how things get done. Even if you are unsure what's involved in such a position, there are many long-serving leaders who would be more than happy to share or delegate with someone willing to learn.

While it may be the most visible place where we need volunteers, not everyone has the free time to commit to leadership. Many teams meet just once a month to review current needs and plan for upcoming events, and would welcome new members or just those curious about what they can do to help. Attendance doesn't mean commitment, but can be a way to provide input and offer suggestions. Church Council is another place where planning and participation is encouraged. The meetings are open to all, and a great way to learn about (and become involved in) the life of the church.

Perhaps you have a skill or interest that you're willing to share, such as art, music, cooking, teaching or technology. We welcome those of exceptional or modest talents to inspire and fulfill in whatever way they may feel comfortable. Even swinging a hammer or baking a casserole can be devotional exercises in the context of our church's ministry.

Finally, we need people who are willing to roll up their sleeves and contribute in small,


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practical ways. Church services, mission opportunities, and social occasions offer a wide-range of opportunities to "fill in." Sign-up sheets by the elevator or on the credenza in the fellowship room are a great way to find-a-need, meet-a-need, including things like providing flowers for the chancel, greeting for a Sunday service, or bringing supplies for the next community dinner.

Small acts have a large impact

We are a church that considers diversity a strength, and which recognizes that growth necessarily requires change. Many of us find that serving others is one of the most rewarding ways to live out our faith. When you volunteer, you're not just fulfilling a need within the church. You're becoming part of the larger story of the church's mission and vision. 
