### Our 'Be the Church' Rally

I dread making posterboards for anything; I always have. Even as a kid when I liked to draw and never shied away from an opportunity to have the spotlight, I hated making presentational posterboard displays. Whether it was for a junior high science fair project, or one of those insufferable history timeline presentations, inevitably several of my classmates' posterboards

looked way cooler than mine, which really got under my skin especially after I had spent so much time writing, tracing, coloring, and aligning. I came to despise posterboard projects even more when I discovered later in life that many of my classmates' stunning posterboards were actually made by their parents.

And yet when we get to Rally Sunday every year, my heart softens. A sense of nostalgia springs up in me when I think about all of us gathering as a group around our important projects to share about what we do and why. It throws me back to those feelings of enchantment around a new school year. I even look forward to seeing the posterboard displays, knowing they look better than anything I could hope to create.

What really stands out to me about our Rally Sunday festivities every year is how it's a little, intentional celebration about the ways we embody our mission to 'be the church.' We're a creative church body with many ideas and methods for expressing ourselves, serving our community, becoming more hospitable, and living the common life together. When I look around the Bess Fulton room on Rally Sunday, I'm reminded of how life in Christ and life together is supposed to be dynamic and fun. It's too easy for church to become stale, stagnant, and stuck in one mode of expression. Churches both as institutions and bodies of faith should

be alive and active in many ways.

I'm thankful that our church does not just talk about 'being the church.' I'm thankful that 'being the church' for us looks like having an art team, a team dedicated to social justice and activism, regular bar outings to talk about big ideas and concepts, a women's group that's been around for the better part of a century, a team dedicated to the care and welfare of our congregants, multiple Bible studies, and plenty more. And I'm grateful to all of you not just for these teams, or just for staying active and making our church look cool, or for your poster-boards. I'm grateful to all of you for seriously and consistently and joyfully embodying the mission to 'be the church.'


# 42nd Annual Charlotte Area CROP Hunger Walk

The 42nd Annual Charlotte CROP Walk is sponsored by area churches coming together to stamp out hunger through concentrated fund-raising benefitting neighbors in need, locally and globally. Area churches, businesses, and organizations seek donations to meet our \$25,000 goal, with help from our dedicated Walkers who walk to symbolize the steps people near and far need to take to live.



There will be music, food, encouragement to cheer on the walkers.

Why walk? (Why not just give?)

**Walking shows solidarity** with the millions who walk miles every day in search of food and water, both in our country and around the world.

**Because as we walk, we gather.** We cross denominational lines and partner with local organizations who stand on the front line facing the challenge. Locally, three agencies, SIREN/Eaton Shelter, St. Vincent de Paul, and Helping Hands Food Pantry, directly benefit from the funds raised.

As a community, our goal is to raise \$25,000. But walking is not the only way to raise funds. Within the community there are other opportunities. For example:

Cravings Gourmet Popcorn Sales – 50% goes to CROP now through September 14

Community Night at Culver's in Charlotte, 10% goes to CROP, September 15, 5 to 8 pm

Applebee's Charlotte, 10% goes to CROP, September 24, 4 to 9 pm

Helping Hands Food Pantry Event at ALIVE, September 27, 5 to 8 pm

# Pub Theology: 'What do you mean by that?'

Words we throw around in church settings like "faith," "spiritual," "Christian," and others tend to mean different things to different people. "Christian" to one person may primarily be a label of their religious affiliation, and to another it's a description of an ethic like that of Christ, and to another it may describe a type of person they want nothing to do with. To some it may be a label to embrace and redeem, and to others it may be one to avoid altogether. Oddly enough, for how important



such words are for church and church people, sometimes when we come to church for services, rituals, service projects, or events it doesn't always feel like it's the right setting to explore what we mean by them.

Our Pub Theology gatherings are where we explore topics like that. We get together at the local bar, one person brings a topic of discussion, we order drinks and food, and we open the floor for conversation and curiosity. Pub Theology is when we get away from the hustle and bustle and performance of regular church time to talk openly about what we might even mean by church. Unlike a sermon, there's not one person doing the talking and telling others what to think or believe. And unlike Bible studies (though we might use a text or a quote as a conversation prompt), there's no book, or script to lean on to decide how you think or feel about a topic. We come with just our thoughts and experiences.

In our thoroughly religiously, spiritually, philosophically, socially, and politically pluralistic time, taking time to converse and process together is sacred space. And yes, we have talked about what we mean by "sacred." We open the floor to listen and learn from one another, even if we disagree. Pub Theology is where we dissect and deconstruct, inquire and investigate, and have sobering conversations, believe it or not. All are welcome at Pub Theology, regardless of faith, religion, church affiliation, or preference of drink.

# Jesus' Ethics Training

# Bible Study for Adults: Tuesdays, 6:30-8 pm

During my last semester at University of Michigan, I learned that English translations of Ancient Greek, including the Bible had long been censored for sexual content, due to pressure from conservative Christians. "This is why we learn Greek," she said.

It was at Michigan that I began to see the Christian narrative as an unethical, anti-Semitic tools tailored to ignore a thousand years of Jewish ethics and coopt the title, Chosen. I responded in 1992 by teaching Historical Jesus to Methodists.

I still teach, because Christianity still hurts people.

My understanding of Faith compels me to study intriguing thoughts and events then gather with friends to weigh them. Faithful, to me, is villagers gather to ask civically pertinent questions like, "But won't they suffer?" while emperors and warlords shoot those who stand to speak.

In the long skein of ethical people who stood against Empire, where do I stand? How do I know? These are very old questions and fodder for Tuesdays. In good times and in bad we're supposed to haul them out.

Ethics is a conversation about ethics. It has been thus since Sophocles wrote plays about ordinary people and Socrates got young men to question the motives of their fathers; one of those teens being Plato. The pedagogical beginning for Jews is perhaps the moment Moses beats to death the symbol of Pharaoh's Whip-based Economy.



Tuesday evenings are different. This semester we'll knock on the doors of Judaism and Platonism to hear what made Jesus talk like Jesus. From Bronze Age Law Givers to John the Baptist we'll hear cries for a better world by way of a more ethical human population.
